

Birdingbury Parish Council Report

The Parish Council had our last meeting this year on 17 November. We will next meet on 19 January 2026 where, amongst other things, we will be discussing the level of precept needed for the future year.

There were a number of issues that had been raised with councillors, of many types, from sewage smells to slippery leaves, through smoke, stiles and dangerous junctions. Actions were agreed to be taken or followed up in respect of all those which fell within our powers or where we felt we could otherwise assist.

Discussion continues with Councillor Dale Keeling in respect of his offers to see whether there is any available funding for play equipment, or in respect of cleaning the war memorial. Many thanks were offered to a villager who has also offered to help raise funding to clean the war memorial, depending where our conversations on that come out – I am sure others would also pitch in, if it did come to that point. We have been looking into suitable contractors to carry out the work if we do succeed in getting the funding.

In respect of the long running issue of village connectivity, there are two parallel streams of possibility. One is the now completed work by CityFibre, where a number of villagers have now succeeded in contracting with the providers on CityFibre's website, or in response to direct approaches, to get fibre to the premises. CityFibre have agreed to a meeting to talk to those who have remaining questions about how this all works, and we will communicate a date once that is available – it will either be in December or January. Interestingly, some villagers have been approached by Openreach also offering fibre to the premises, following CityFibre's work.

The second stream is the approach by Atlas Towers in relation to a potential 5G mast in or near the village. Approaches have been made to their two preferred sites and, if those residents are not in favour of going ahead, further sites on their list will be contacted.

Finally, those villagers with children at school might want to be aware of the following: Warwickshire County Council has launched a public consultation on proposed changes to its Home to School Transport Policy. The consultation invites residents to share their views on a series of updates aimed at improving fairness, consistency, and compliance with home to school national guidance. To take part in the consultation, please go to the WCC website. Apparently one element of this is a consideration of extending the two mile policy to five miles, so it may be worth having a look.

Finally – to wish you all a very merry Christmas and all the best for 2026!

Remembrance in Birdingbury: Quiet Acts of Service

As Remembrance Day passed once more, the people of Birdingbury gathered at the village War Memorial: heads bowed, the air still, and for two minutes, the world seemed to pause. Surrounded by familiar faces and the sound of the wind in the trees, it felt as though time itself stood still and we were joined by all those who had once stood in that same spot, remembering those who served and sacrificed.

Birdingbury has its own deep connections to those times. The former prisoner of war camp that once stood on the edge of the village is part of that story - a reminder that even amid conflict, humanity could still be found. And many here will remember Bill Cowley, who lived quietly among us and yet carried with him an extraordinary history. Bill was awarded the Légion d'Honneur, France's highest honour, for his service in the liberation of Europe. Like so many of his generation, he never sought praise. He simply did what was right, and then came home to live a life of gentle dignity and kindness.

That same quiet spirit still runs through our remarkable, and in many ways, unique community today. It can be seen in the work of St Leonard's Church, in the cheerful bustle of the Tuesday Café, and in the quiet ways neighbours look out for one another. Much of what keeps Birdingbury such a special place is done without fanfare, without anyone watching.

That kindness also reaches beyond the boundaries of our village. Many among us give their time and energy to charitable causes further afield: supporting those in need; volunteering; or quietly offering their professional skills for the good of others. These acts, too, often go unseen, yet they reflect the same deep-rooted generosity of spirit that strengthens our community from within.

The Bible tells us, *“When you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing.”* (Matthew 6:3). It's a beautiful reminder that the truest form of generosity comes from the heart, not from the need to be seen. There are many in this village who live by that quietly offering help, comfort, or companionship without ever drawing attention to themselves.

Public service takes many shapes. For some, it's a calling to wear a uniform: to serve in the armed forces, nursing, or policing. For others, it's found in the unseen, everyday acts of care that hold a community together, checking in on someone living alone, delivering a meal, lending a listening ear. It's rarely the easiest and certainly not the most financially rewarded path, but those who serve in this way often do so because it's simply who they are, and whilst not seeking attention, they are surely deserving of our gratitude.



As we reflect on this year's Remembrance Day, we remember not only the bravery of those who gave their lives, but also the continuing spirit of service that lives quietly among us. In a world where so much noise competes for attention, there is something deeply moving about those who choose to serve in silence. Their example reminds us that true worth is not measured by what we have, but by how we give and that, perhaps, is the most fitting way to honour the past.



It is this same spirit of kindness, humility, and quiet generosity that makes Birdingbury such a very special place to live, and reminds us how fortunate we are to call it home.

Tour du Mont Blanc

Three years ago, Chris and I did a couple of day walks in the Swiss Alps, and having a real yen to return, searched for three to four day treks near the Eiger. A ten day trek right round Mont Blanc caught our eyes instead. We had never done any other Alpine trekking, but each day was ‘only’ the equivalent of scaling one and a half times Scafell and down again, and we had climbed that last summer, so how hard could it be? The accommodation was in a mixture of mountain huts and small B+Bs, and although Chris had sworn NEVER to sleep in a dormitory again, we persuaded ourselves that a mix would be ok. We booked in March, promising ourselves we would train and we did a number of trips to Dobbies with full rucksacks on our backs (imagining the walk up from the railway line to Long Mile had similarities to the Alps!).


Suddenly it was July. We did a couple of walks in the Lake District to see whether our ‘training’ had been effective, realised we had aged a bit and spent a frantic week debating whether to pull out. In the end, we decided it was now or never (we are never going to get any younger!), trusted to what we hoped was our natural fitness), and naively set off on the train, via Paris, to Les Houches, just short of Chamonix. Boy, did those mountains look big! But they also looked majestic, bathing in the late August sun. That was last sun we saw for a few days. The day we set off, fog settled in, and of the ten days we spent walking, all but two were cloudy and rainy for at least part, if not most of the day.

No getting away from it; the walk was tough (understatements don’t come any more obvious than this). It is a very popular route, extremely well sign posted and, although nearly at the end of the season, there were plenty of other walkers to meet and talk to. The paths were similar to the Lakes, but better maintained, it was just that the climbs were much, much longer. Steph found going up much easier and we walked at the same rate as everyone else. But she took 30% longer coming down, so the days fell in to a familiar pattern of Steph going ahead on the way up, Chris catching up at the top and then forging ahead on the way down. Chris walks with podcasts on, and was soon known amongst other walkers for producing the ‘interesting fact of the day’ (at least in his eyes), be it history, construction or folklore and quite a few looked forward to it. Even in the rain, the scenery was stupendous.

We didn’t see so much of Mont Blanc in France but the day we crossed into Italy, the sun came out and we stood on the border with the massive Dolomite-like face of Mont Blanc towering above us, glacial rivers far below us in the valleys. Mountain huts provided water and welcome cups of coffee every three to four hours, and the last of the



alpine flowers sprinkled the slopes. In Italy, we were lucky enough to stay in one of the iconic mountain huts, with communal meals, great company, and close up views of storms in the mountains, peaks shifting in and out of the rolling mists.



On the fourth day, when the climb seemed unrelenting and never ending, Chris officially declared himself old. Luckily, crossing into Switzerland, we left the high routes and wound our way through forests straight out of Grimm's fairytales. The houses looked like toy cuckoo clocks and everything was immaculate, just as if we had stepped into a book. At Champex there was a glacier lake where Steph was able to swim, Chris looking on for moral support.

Back into France, we hit our nadir. Whilst the communal meals are a real highlight of staying in hostels and huts, dorm

accommodation is not. On the penultimate day, when it was pouring with rain, we were at an 'attic style' hut. No communal room, so either sitting in a damp dorm or outside, nine beds in a room half as big and half as high as the Birbury, two toilets between sixty people and literally only two lettuce leaves for one course of the meal. By this time we were tired and disheartened and the next day we tramped through eight hours of mist to reach Chamonix.




The last day was wonderful though, high up above an immersion, with Mont Blanc towering overhead, chamois, ibex and marmots around, and for once, very few people. The last couple of hours ended in style, a huge thunderstorm, torrential rain and at last we were through the arch we started at. 120 miles, 33,000 feet of climbing, and this time a shared resolution to NEVER SLEEP IN A DORM AGAIN!

The Best Birdingbury Mulled Wine

(Serves 10-12)

Ingredients

- ❖ 2 bottles of red wine (affordable but drinkable)
- ❖ 300ml Orange Juice
- ❖ 600ml medium cider or ginger beer
- ❖ 2 cinnamon sticks
- ❖ 4 cloves
- ❖ 2 star anise
- ❖ 1 orange and one lemon, sliced into wheels then halved
- ❖ 4 tbsp demerara sugar (or honey)
- ❖ A splash of brandy, port or Cointreau (optional, but festive)



Method

1. Pour the wine into a large saucepan.
2. Add orange slices, spices, and sugar.
3. Heat gently—never boil (unless vinegar is your thing).
4. Simmer for 20 mins, remove cloves, cinnamon sticks and star anise
5. Ladle into mugs and sip wisely.

And finally, this Christmas, may your spices be fragrant, your mugs full, and your wine gently steaming.

Cheers to a season of warmth, laughter, and just the right amount of festive tipsiness.
